Gospel: Luke 3:10-18 [John the Baptist preached Good News]

Peter: Do you know how many times the word joy or rejoice or joyful is in the readings today? It occurs 11 times.

How are you rejoicing during this season? What makes you happy?

Anna: The candle for today PINK because today is Gaudete Sunday. "Gaudete" is a Latin word for "rejoice." We brought a few new friends to tell us HOW they are rejoicing & WHAT makes them happy.

Harry the horse: My name is Harry. I am a soldier.

I am happy because I heard the good news in today's 1st reading

from the prophet Zephaniah. He says,

"the King of Israel, the Lord is in your midst; he will rejoice over you with gladness."

And then I heard more good news in the 2nd reading from the apostle Paul: "Rejoice in the Lord always, your kindness should be known to all ... the Lord is near."

I am so happy because I have a leader who loves me. He is my Lord. When I am following his lead, I don't need to force anyone to give me money or to do things for me or accuse anyone of something they did not do. I am even satisfied with my pay. I can do what John the Baptist asks me to do.

Peter: What Harry is saying reminds me of a sign in my house that I like,

Joy is not the absence of sorrow, it is the presence of God.

That means that I can have joy underneath the worst pain, because I know God loves me.

When I know that I can get through anything. That's one of the gifts I receive from my family, ~my parents, ~my sisters, ~my brother, ~my nephews & nieces,

- they can laugh at the most sorrowful times, because we love each other & believe we are loved.

Rudy the Rat: My name is Rudy. I am one of the tax collectors John baptized.

Everyone thinks I'm a Rat. And sometimes I am. But I rejoice that God forgives me. John told me that. He also told me I had to <u>stop</u> cheating people by collecting more than they owed and keeping it for myself.

Jesus [who came after John] showed me that I was forgiven and gave me the Holy Spirit so that I could then forgive other people too, -- the same way I was forgiven

Now I not only have joy in my heart, but I can give it to others.

Ricky the Raccoon: I am I am so happy to hear about food in the gospel.

I love food. In fact, I look for it whenever I can, & I always wash it before I eat it.

I rejoice that I can share the food I collect with my own family,

and with people who don't have enough.

I don't have to hoard food, or any of the other stuff I collect.

I've heard that there is enough food to feed everyone in the world,

we just have to stop wasting food and figure out how to get it to the people who are hungry.

Sal the Sheep: My name is Sal.

I rejoice because I heard the good news that I do not need to be afraid.

Zephaniah [that Hebrew prophet] said, "Fear not, do not be discouraged."

And the New Testament Apostle, Paul, wrote,

"Have no anxiety at all-then the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts & minds in Ehrist Jesus."

I am so full of joy that I can give some of my wool to someone who needs a cloak or a coat. I only have one coat, but it grows back after I am shorn, so I can give it away when the right time comes. I remember hearing the great Saint Basil once say, "The second coat in your closet belongs to the poor."

I am glad to be a part of the flock that Jesus leads......and......I'm really glad

that we are all members of the same family with Jesus as our Shepherd.

I think if everybody knew we are all one family

there would not be so many people cold or hungry or without a home.

Anna: In today's Readings from Zephaniah, Paul and Luke, our friends heard: Rejoice, be happy, be joyful, be at peace, all words

How are you going to Gaudete [rejoice in the Lord always] as you prepare for Christmas? Our friends have some questions to help you think about that:

Harry: Are you taking time to remember the reason for the season? To remember that the Lord is near, that God is in our midst? **Rudy:** Are you changing what needs to be changed, asking for forgiveness for your sins, forgiving those who hurt you? Ricky: Are you feeding the hungry - those who are hungry for food, but also for love, for acceptance, for truth? Sal: Are you sharing what you have with those who are cold or despairing or afraid? Anna: Those are all ways we can "rejoice in the Lord" - and experience the peace that goes beyond understanding. That is how we can move *through* darkness, cold and grieving *to* the joy of a new birth. That's the path from Advent to Christmas. That is how we can remind the whole world that joy is not the absence of sorrow, it is the presence of God. There is another song we sing at this time of year that has the word rejoice in it. \square O come, Thou Dayspring from on high ~ And cheer us by thy drawing nigh; Disperse the gloomy clouds of night, ~ And death's dark shadow put to flight.
